Call for Participation: 5th ASIS SIG/CR Workshop 1994

The American Society for Information Science Special Interest Group on Classification Research invites submissions for its 5th Workshop to be held at the 57th Annual Meeting of ASIS in Alexandria, VA. The workshop will take place Sunday, Oct.16, 1994, 8:30 AM - 5:00 PM. ASIS'94 continues through Thursday, Oct.20.

The workshop with the topic: *Questions, Controversies, and Conclusions in Classification Research* is designed to be an exchange of ideas among researchers with interests in the creation, development, management, representation, display, comparison, compatibility, theory, and application of classification schemes. Emphasis will be on semantic classification, in contrast to statistically based schemes. Topics include, but are not limited to:

Warrant for concepts in classification schemes - Concept acquisition, Basis for semantic classes - Automated techniques to assist in creating classification schemes - Statistical techniques used for developing explicit semantic classes - Relations and their properties - Inheritance and subsumption - Knowledge representation schemes - Classification algorithms - Procedural knowledge in classification schemes - Reasoning with classification schemes - Software for management of classification schemes - Interfaces for displaying classification schemes - Data structures and programming languages for classification schemes - Image classification - Comparison and compatibility between classification schemes - Applications such as subject analysis, natural language understanding, information retrieval, expert systems.

The CR Workshop welcomes submissions from various disciplines. Those interested in participating are invited to submit a short (1-2 page single-spaced) position paper summarizing substantive work that has been conducted in the above areas or other areas related to semantic classification schemes, and a statement briefly outlining the reason for wanting to participate in the workshop. Submissions may include background papers as attachments. Participation will be of two kinds: presenter and regular participant. Those selected as presenters will be invited to submit expanded versions of their papers and to speak to those papers in brief presentations during the workshop. All position papers (both expanded and short papers) will be published in proceedings to be distributed prior to the workshop. The workshop registration fee is \$35.00.

U.K.: CRG 294

The 294th Meeting of the British Classification Research Group was held at University College London on Thursday, Dec. 9, 1993. The minutes recorded 8 persons present who continued the discussions on the revision of the Bliss Classification system with respect to the Class V, Arts. Mr. MILLS stated that the outline structure for the class was now formalized and in place and that Mr. BALL could proceed to fill in the detail. Movements, schools and styles were in the general section. After a discussion of some details concerning, e.g. 'the location of the artist', Mr. LANGRIDGE circulated a paper outlining a classification for theatre. Discussion remarks by COATES, NEILSON, FOSKETT, and LANGRIDGE are reported. The next meeting was scheduled for Febr.25, 1994 in order to discuss the general structure of the entire Art class in BC2.

3rd Seminar on Classification and Documentary Languages, Rio de Janeiro

Promoted by the Brazilian Federation of Library Associations, FEBAB and with the support of various organizations Ms. Hagar E. GOMES organized a 3rd Seminar on Classification and Documentary Languages from 8-10 Dec.1993 at the Biblioteca Estadual of Rio de Janeiro. We hope to hear more on the results of this seminar in the next issue of this journal.

Terminology and Knowledge Engineering, TKE'93

The Third International Congress on Terminology and Knowledge Engineering took place in the Maternushaus Congress Center in Cologne from 25 to 27 August 1993. More than 200 participants from nearly 30 countries participated. About 50 papers were presented in 8 sessions with two sessions running in parallel. There were opening and closing keynote lectures and a plenary session on Terminology Policy and Co-operation on the second day.

The program of the Congress was published in Knowledge Organization 1993-2, p.88-89. The Congress included an exhibition where projects, literature and software was presented. In the pre-conference program, 5 workshops were held on the topics: Copyright in Terminology, Terminology Interchange Format, INTERCOCTA, Microcomputer-based Terminology Management Software, and Teaching Methods and Teaching Material for Terminology. The reports on the results of these Workshops (by Chr. Galinski, K.-D. Schmitz, G. Budin, H. Picht) are included in the last issue of the Newsletter for Terminology and Knowledge Transfer, 1993/1-4, p.13-18 (Dec.1993).

During the TKE Congress, several general assemblies and board meetings (IITF, TermNet, Infoterm Advisory Committee, and GTW) as well as a working group meeting took place (on Evaluation of Terminology Management Software (GTW/AG1)). Also, the first meeting of the Initiative for German Terminology, which was formed at the suggestion of the German and Austrian

UNESCO Commission was held (see also Knowl.Org. 1993-3, p.162).

Medical Terminology Bank of WHO

WHOTERM, the database management system of the World Health Organization was developed by the technical terminology service of the World Health Organization under Mr. Pierre Lewalle originally in order to meet its in-house terminology needs and to assist in collaborative work with WHO member states. In 1993 WHOTERM has been expanded, it is now assumed to comprise some 30,000 terms available. WHOTERM is delivered on a single floppy disk to be installed very quickly using the automatic installation module. The system can handle any number of languages, one pair at a time. The basic PC version only handles languages using the Latin script, but the enhanced version, using appropriate character drivers, can display Cyrillic or Arabic scripts also.

The entries contain sources, definitions, classifications, explanatory notes and grammatical information and terms can be grouped by thesaurus class or subject. Bibliographical references can be included. For further details contact: WHOTERM, M.Pierre Lewalle, WHO, CH-1211 Genève 27.

IFCS-93, Paris

The fourth conference of the International Federation of Classification Societies, Paris, 31 Aug.-4 Sept.1993 attracted 280 registrants and seemed to have been a successful event, regarding the 41 sessions with 3-4 papers each, sometimes running in parallel even 5 at a time! In addition, 5 invited lectures, a panel session on "*Perspectives in Classification and the Future of IFCS*" and 42 poster sessions were listed in the program. The topics of the sessions of the mathematically-statistically oriented societies were:

MDS and distance analysis - Symbolic data analysis (2) - Quality control - Spatial clustering - Consensus - Information Retrieval - Analysis of vague data - Data analysis (3) - Learning - Uncertainty and classification - Applications - Multivariate analysis - Dissimilarities and hierarchies - Percolation and valley seeking - Sequence analysis - Dissimilarities - Survey analysis - Prospects in classification and data analysis - Image - Probabilistic models - Cluster analysis - Types and objects in computer sciences - Neural networks and classification - Sequence and genome analysis - Distances and classification - Diagnostic key and cladograms - Discriminant analysis - Classification/categorization and knowledge architecture - Classification in biology - Comparative approaches in data analysis and classification in Western countries and East Asia countries - Classification with constraints - Classification and trees - Non-symmetric data analysis - Medical image processing - Classification in practice - Phylogeny - Data analysis and comparing classification - Astronomy.

Before the conference four tutorials, each lasting for 3 hours were given on the topics: *Combinatorial methods - Analysis of spatial data with applications to ecology and biogeography - Symbolic data analysis - Survey analysis.* President of this event was Prof. E. DIDAY. The Interna-

tional Scientific Committee comprised 18 persons from 10 countries.
